to write but always in Hopes of getting a Letter
from you dear General I put it off from Day to
Day. However as our Departure is drawing near hasten
one more from here to recall myself to your Memory.
A More Salutary Winter I could never have spent
as this. The Climate, The Quietness of the Place
and All the Kindnesses I have received from my
Dear Parents during my Stay here have contributed
greatly towards my Recovery. The very happy looking

both I and Mr & Hanstein lived upon together has not
a little contributed towards keeping me in that State
of Mind the most proper for my Situation. When the
Mind is occupied and uneasy The Physic can not have
that Effect on the Body as when it is at Ease. In
my Opinion It is the happiest winter I have ever
spent yet and you can not think Dear General
how grateful I feel myself towards the Almighty
for his innumerable Kindnesses towards me during
this winter. With a little Care I hope soon to be
entirely recovered and become a useful Member
to Society. During the whole winter I have oc-
