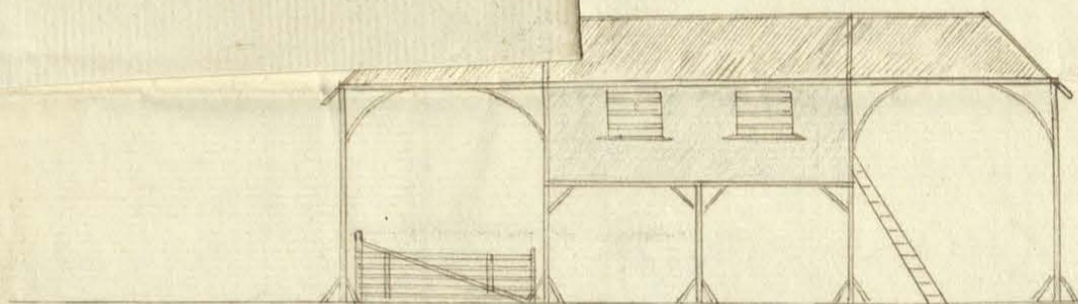

Sketch for a Cart House and Granary to be erected from Mr. Barnell's Granary but of different Dimensions at the Flemish Farm.



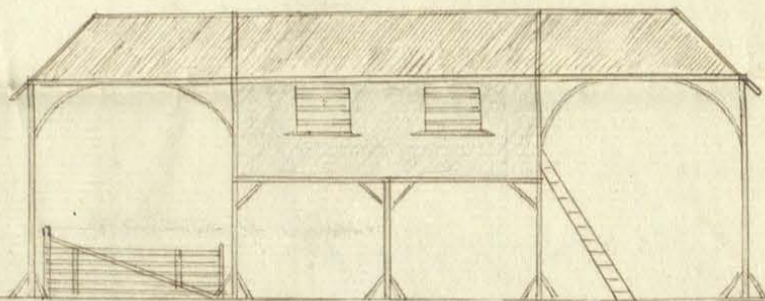

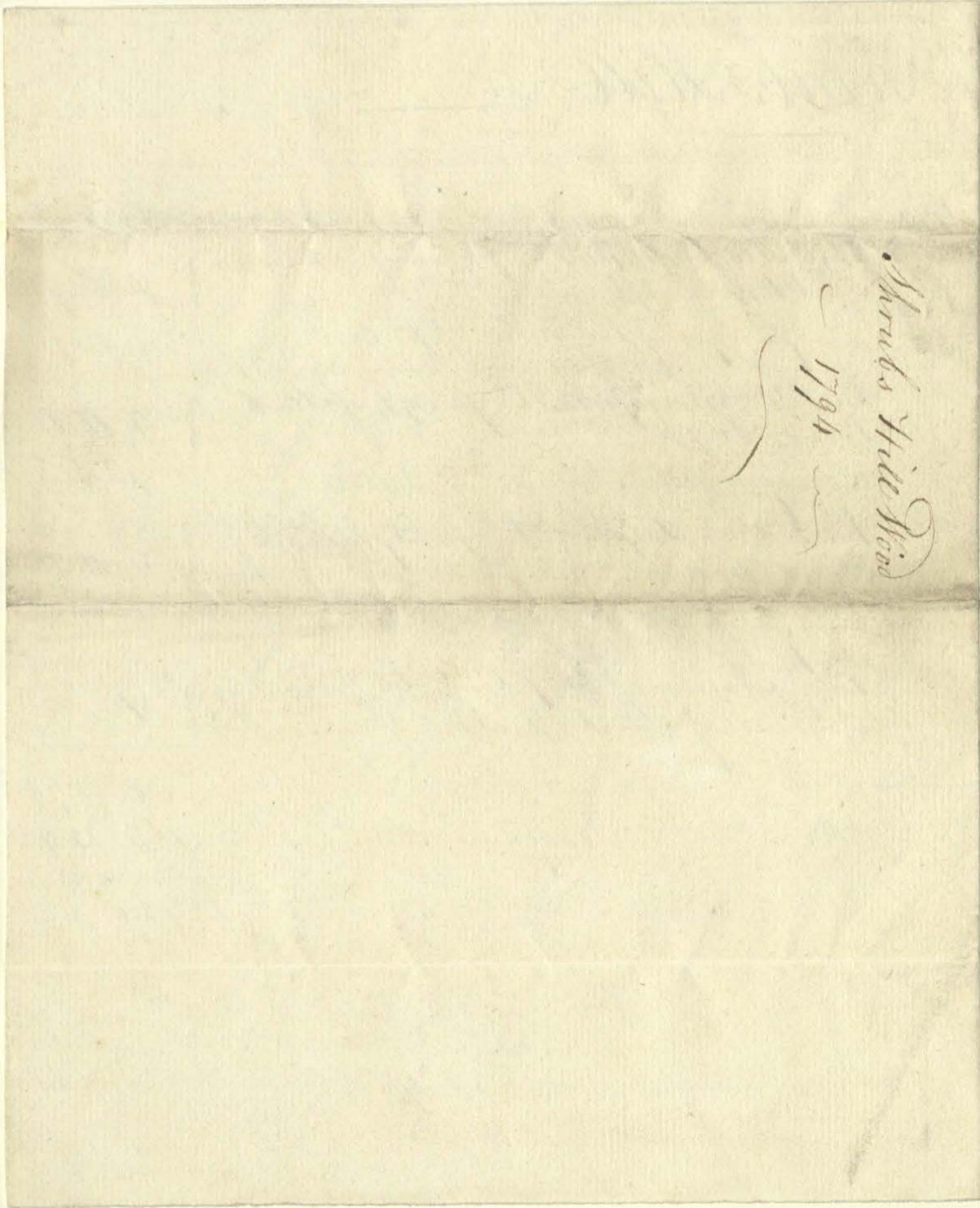

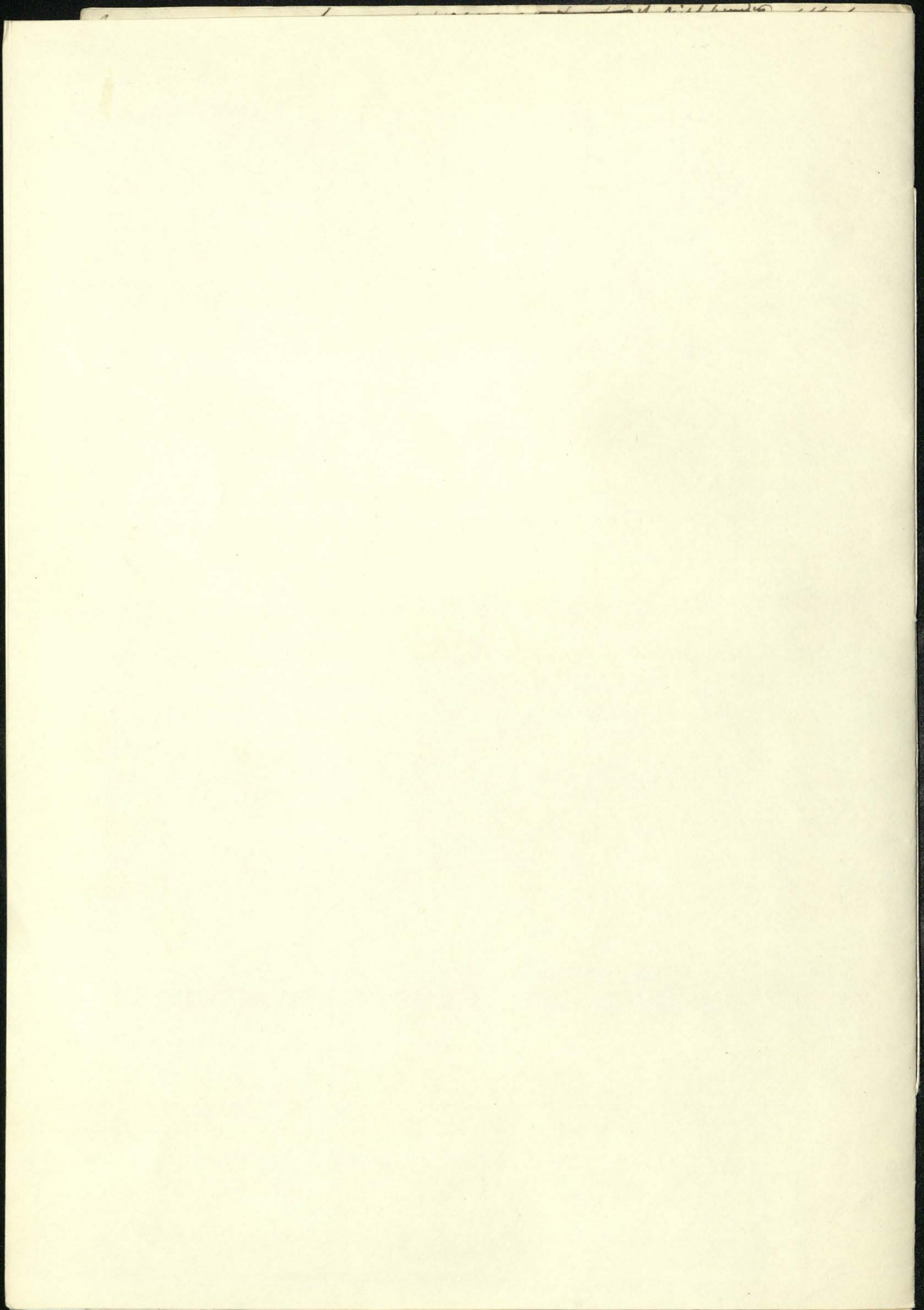

January 1st 1797.

It having been very judiciously observed by Mr. Kent, that at present there is not sufficient food to stall feed above Thirty Oxen, and that the remaining Twenty five must be fattened on Grass and parted with in the Autumn; It is therefore suggested, whether as the Oxen to be stall fed are taken from work in May, that they may be freshened in the Leasows, and taken from thence the first of December for stall feeding; it would not be right to follow a similar mode with those to be fattened on Grass, that is taking them from work at Christmas, feeding them during winter in the Straw Yard, till the meadow allotted for fattening them be fit in Spring for their reception; one advantage would arise from this arrangement, instead of Fifty five Oxen being brought to Work in Summer, Twenty six of them would have been then some months at work.

Nathaniel Kent - Memorandum

January 1st 1797.

The System now adopted in the management of Windsor Great Park, seems so thoroughly grounded on Rational Principles confirmed by Experience; that nothing is now required, but a steady adherence to the Rules which have been laid down.

If any improvement can be devised, it is by adding some Arable Land to the Gloucester Farm; as that is certainly the best ground, but has not raised a sufficient quantity of Cabbage to fatten the Oxen taken from work and intended for the Market.

It is proposed therefore to add Cranborne Paddock to this Farm, to Plough the North, South, and East parts of it, which will amount to Eighty Acres, and to enclose the Planted part with a pale as a Season for Oxen;

It is proposed to divide the Eighty Acres of Arable Land into four Shifts viz. 1. 20. Acres
Wheat

Wheat. 2. 20 Acres of Cabbage. 3. 20. Acres of Oats.
4. 20. Acres of Beans.

The Compliment of Oxen at Work in the Gloucester farm is now Eighteen Oxen, to which if six Oxen be added, this Work can be effectually carried on without detriment to that already in hand; but it must be observed, that these six are to be assisted by the eighteen others.

The mode proposed, is instantly to put six of the home-bred Oxen with an additional Ploughman and Boy to this Work, to sow this Spring forty Acres with Oats; Summer fallow twenty Acres, to be sowed next Autumn with Wheat, and Spring 1798. break up the remaining 20. Acres for Oats.
