but that so all that is good I guess to say,
 at first waking Mear's leg irritable
 but some that half hour on leg—
 very angry irritable & high— Dr
 Barlow gave us a sad melancholy
 account, the visit did not last five
 minutes as he was violent against
 Dr. Penick, Dr. Willis told the L. that
 He was an appearance with
 Mear but ungen agreed Mear
 was suppressed, for he had not
 forgiven what he had said yester-
 day that within the last hour, since
 the Physician had been in, he had
 calmed, & as a proof of it had voided
 a quantity which he found him-
 self too unequal in the morning to
 agree to yet Dr. W. was of opinion
 that the paroxysm was not at
 its height, he might remain

pretty calm for some hours but he
 expected another burst about five
 o'clock - He appeared now to be
 open sincere & candid, My Mother
 mind more at ease & thoroughly
 satisfied which will give you
 excellent heart pleasure -
 I wish now say adieu
