

Weymouth August 12 1805

Dear Greenwood

I have only time to write two lines to acknowledge the receipt of your letter by which I am now sorry that I was surprised to learn that neither you nor Adam have as yet been able to hit off any scheme for procuring a supply of money for present relief. I shall be here without fail early the day after tomorrow when we will talk the business over, and I am no doubt of the worst comes to the worst that I can manage the same way as other people.

With regard to drawing upon Collier's name I had no intention of doing it at least till

I returned to Rome, but I am perfectly prepared
for them refusing my drafts, and only hope
that Adam has communicated to them that
part of my letter which concerned them.

I am rejoiced to be able to give you a
most excellent account of his Majesty, I
think that in my life I never saw him in
better health, and his eyes far improved
since I have been beyond my most
 sanguine expectation as that of Chappin
who came down here yesterday with the
intention of staying some days but
has found the King going on so well that
he returns to the Court of today and does
not return unless sent for for a fortnight

God bless you, and bless the crew
