Dear Greenwood

As the poor Duke of Gloucesters Funeral is now
over and that the success to the different attempts
that had become vacant by his death on our side
publicly, I must have recourse to you to get the
information concerning them that have fallen to my
share, and about what I am to expect as the
result thereof.

You will have heard that from particular
circumstances, of which I am sure you are well
acquainted, my stay here till next Wednesday evening
is that you will find me at the Horse Guards, on
Thursday, I will therefore be impossible for me to
do so till you on Thursday as I had intended, but
I am yours ever for the Thursday following. I remain

also upon your coming to Holland, next Saturday
As Mr. Hall has many things to talk over.

I know that you ^{will} rejoice at the excellent accounts
of His Majesty's ~~health~~, In regard to health I think
that I never in my life have been better, and though
Confidant he has been much affected by the death
of his Mother the loss of which you will feel
surprised, His Highness however has much gained
though I am much afraid that he never can expect
to recover it thoroughly.
