June 1st 1809

Dear Sir,

I am very anxious to have seen you during my stay in Town but fearing that my hour I could appoint would misinform you I did not venture to send as I know your business better you not only I could not assume whether I might have been dismissed at the hour you were waiting for me - I trust I really am most anxious to see you & if it is not asking too much in putting you to the point you misinform me you think it best with you I manage under some pretext or other to come here on Sunday if a business day; but as the Queen is here I wish you find out some reason in the world why to trouble to find out what I want of you - The fact is that I am sadly annoyed about our friends the Cherleys and want to talk over with you what can be done; I do not wish that my money should have an idea I have asked to see you, so pray do not refuse it to be here although she has desired me when I write to inform to you - I cannot tell you how hurt I was I am, for as far as I can judge with impartiality I think there seems to be fault on both sides; both are wrong in different ways & I should think nothing seems such stuff which will require themselves & them it will be too late to serve them - I was I was much distressed at your money applying to me as I feel I have no right to meddle in their mismanagement but I really was so interested in the welfare of both that I had written a though my thing to save them from the risk of their ending themselves - I find I am not equal to giving advice by myself & perhaps you will kindly talk it over with me & see what is to be done - I am extremely obliged of giving you a Journal have made to be in one but I am sure you will forgive it as it is an account of one of our Queen's daughters

you can be here that I may not make you wait and if you will go to
Mrs. Beckenburgh's room. I will meet you there in evening with her to see
her quarterly out of sight of the Queen - I cannot enter into her details

if I have said too much - I mean to try and write to my friend
and I will send you - by kindest love to Mr. & Mrs. Allen and
