I fully intended writing to You according to my
 promise had any thing favourable occurred here;
 but Alas! I have no comfort to give You - All
 is going on badly in rather remaining in the
 same state, with I say very much more
 little chance of any permanent amendment
 - I am in describing to You the misery of
 this house; with myself I feel myself to
every thing, yet I assure You I do exert my
 self and have lately tried to turn up my
 power and enjoy which is a great amusement
 - I am sure you will be it - You have
 the Boston arrived on 4th past happy days &
 return in more and in other meditation believe
 me I am to be you are not forget in me
 feel myself particularly / that no more the
 little we have picked up all to your knowledge
 - I have a great favor to ask of you; would
 you try to procure for me the house of the
 Queen of Richard Lane to live; I am told it
 is not of great cost, but perhaps you would have

the kindness to enquire what is, and would you
be so good to let me know what I think I can do
to be of use to you. Mr. Calvert is now in
the country and I will send you the
letter in a few days. I have received the letter
from Mrs. Ingham and she says she is
well and most kindly to you. I hope
she is at home as well and that she
and her lovely children are the same. I
must only remain that you do not long
