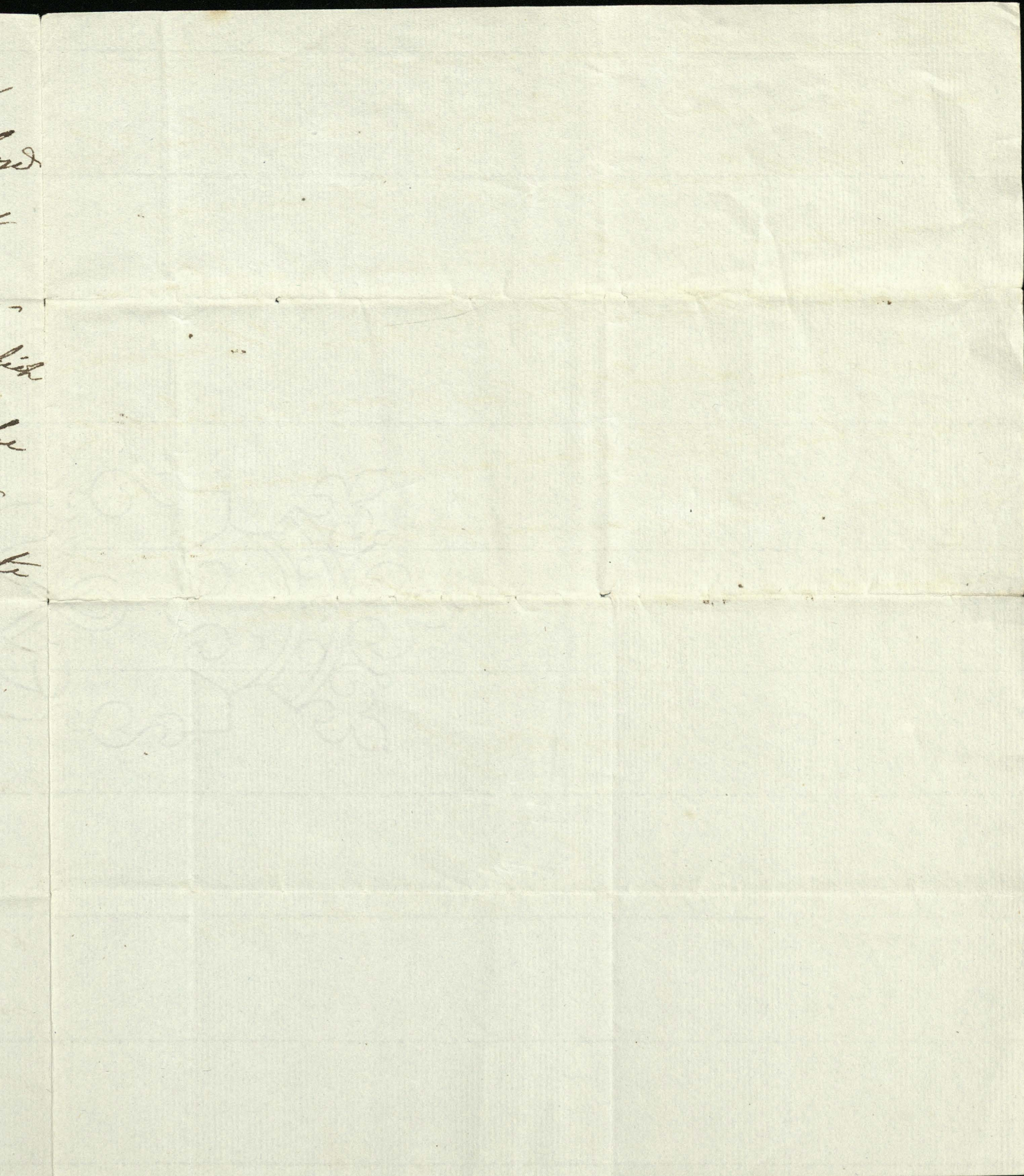
⁴ Yours of 10th Feb: from

pleasure to the circumstance of the Windsor
Castle having been so long and singularly employed
in the Mediterranean. You hope you may yet
remain some months as the French appear at
times about their attack upon Algiers which
I think very doubtful as to success. I shall be
glad when the English are once more in the
battick. I trust you will continue to write
us with ease and we believe so,
