that I am an Inhabitant of the continent
the people give themselves great airs, &
enrich their Masters, what will become
of us all God only knows, I often think
it's the end of the world, for our success
son gives little hopes, of heading in the
Dukes of their Ancestors. it will be a hand
for ill intention people to make use of
against them, Charles is what Mr. Holt
used to call, humane & inoffensive with
a self-conceitedness that renders him
insupportable, his wife is a negative
character much dislike for little failings
that are not worth mentioning, the opinion
that there is nothing to be said against
her sterility is a misfortune that no
body can help, & George the Duke will

not permit to marry, because he is not dignified
nor agreeable, he has a good heart & would
not make his wife unhappy he would
adore her, William that the Duke is set
upon to establish will not hear of a wife
& he is so wild that I can not wish him
to marry till he sees himself the necessity
of it. I cannot finish without recom-
mending to your protection the dear
Princess of Wales whose only comfort is in
your goodness I ever am dear brother
