wish should subsist for her happiness &
wellfare, in one of my precedend letters I
mention'd our wish that our son William
would come to a resolution to marry &
has been a difficult matter to bring him
to think seriously of this step which is
so essential to our Country, for we shall
be dead before the effect of a want of suc-
cession will be felt, so that we persisted
& have at last gain'd our point, Prince
Mary of Baire is the chosen, she chose
him herself which makes him very hap-
py, he is gone to look her through the
Prussian Dominions the Wedding can
not be this year as this journey to Russia
Sweden & Munich when the Elector is to
be going will prevent her returning so soon

to Carlouche, there fails to all this but your consent
