Dear Brother,

Madame de Bohlen who I wrote You word my Sister  
had left me here, has so much desired me to intercede  
for her husband, that he might be taken into the  
Hanoverian Service that I could not refuse the mention

in Holstein, but what he did not succeed, she has been obliged  
to maintain him with what she receives from <sup>my</sup> Sister, which
