Barbary.

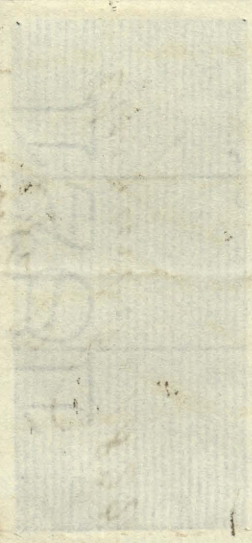
I am glad the Bank stands well, but the

We all arrived here in good health and spirits after

 but I must deprecate the heat and travelling
 have done me extraordinary good and from the
 moment I left Trent I was another man and am
 now quite well: I shall, as heretofore, be regular
 - I send over the papers: but on the twenty first
 I set out for Wintzenburg and thence from thence
 - regularity of the post it will be more prudent to
 leave my letters here: I shall be back on the 24th
 next the August: adieu and ever believe me,
