I am afraid I have not any thing very
 good to send: for the enclosed note, received the day be-
 fore yesterday from the Prince, I was obliged to forward his
 protest to the Prince Regent: get me however our troops
 have suffered severely: the particulars I am not acquaint-
 ed with, but am confident Mr. Thomas Graham is not
 to blame and the courage and discipline of our troops
 cannot be doubted: after the two unsuccessful attempts
 on Antwerp, I feel much for Mr. Thomas:

I have however nothing more to send for the present.

anxious to return home. We have very much to be
