Calais, April 26<sup>th</sup> 1814.

Sir

I had the Honor of delivering your Royal Highness' letters to the King of France & Duchess of Angoulême yesterday immediately on my arrival at this place; and as your Royal Highness permitted me to remain here till the return of Sir J. Boscawen I have transmitted their answers by the Lieutenant of the Snowmouth, it being found impracticable even for the Olympia to get out of the Harbor today. - I have likewise the Honor of forwarding to your Royal Highness an address from the Mayor & Corporation of Dunkirk that was intended to have been presented to your Royal Highness on your landing

landing at this place; and which was delivered to  
me for your Royal Highness by Lord Sidmouth.

The King took his departure for Paris  
in perfect health and in high spirits at  
twelve this day. -

Lordes. Lenox arrived last night with dis-  
patches from Lord Wellington dated at  
Toulouse on the 20<sup>th</sup> with the account of  
an Armistice having taken place between  
the armies in that quarter, and confirming  
the account both of the battle near Toulouse  
as of that of the sortie from Bayonne, with  
the exception that there was no treachery (as  
was expected) by the governor of Bayonne.
