

Thursday Night April 2^d 1812

My Dearst Brother

I am sure your good heart will be anxious to know how our day has gone off - as I have say Frederick told you in return and sending our letters this Morning to the Queen.

I yesterday called my three Sisters together and read them the greater part of the letter you had seen - but I altered the beginning - by returning my thanks to the Queen for the many favours she had so liberally granted every thing for us and then I proceeded to state my wishes exactly as I had done in the original Paper. I told my Sisters that I wished to act with freedom towards them, but that I was far from dictating what they were to do - and therefore should not let any one of them sign the Paper. They all three agreed to this, and each added a separate Note very respectfully & dutifully worded towards the Queen and expressing that they concurred in every thing I had stated in my letter - This Morning I gave them all to Madam Beckhoff and desired she would give them to the Queen after breakfast - When I came in from my ride she brought me a letter from the Queen directed to us all four - I read it & was sorry to my Sisters - and certainly she had mis understood our meaning most completely and upon our referring it to Delphine she kindly wrote to her to say she had mis understood our letter, and in consequence she said for them, and then for us - She was excessively agitated & had cried so much as usually to make herself quite ill. She said alone, but in a good humour and way desired we would come to her at 8 o'clock

and when we went to the she would and led us to see one led upon the Subject
 I will send you the Copy of the letter because in plain truth it was written in
 longer, and I put a Person in a Paper and a Person that is drunk upon the same
 footing, and I think it would be ungenerous to copy it, but you shall see nothing
 of your own to Windsor you will see Adolphus on Saturday, who will relate to you all
 that passed between ^{the} Queen and him. I hope in God the word is over, but I am more
 pleased than I can express that I did not ask any of my Brethren to deliver the
 letter - as the immediate Copy would have extended to them, and that would have
 made me amiable.

I would not go to bed till I had written you this account. I am happy this day
 is over for we passed a miserable morning indeed
 God bless you my dear Brother
