most wonderful production for a

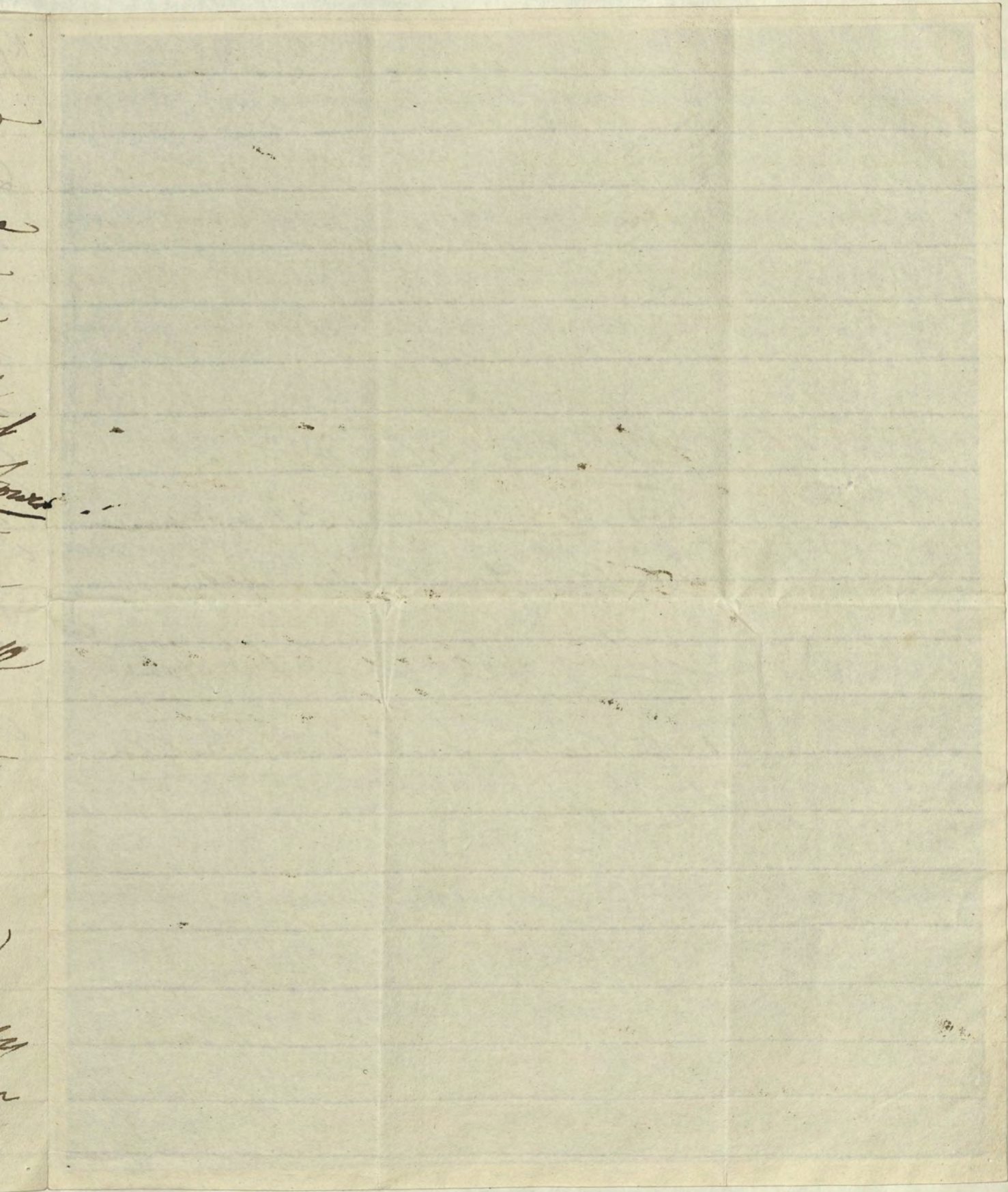


Boy of his age - in short all here are
