Windsor Castle Oct. 14. 1790.

Dear William, I have received your letter of congratulations on the safe delivery of the Queen, who thank God is quite recovered; I am glad to find by a letter from the Rear Admiral that your conduct in general meets with his approbation, and I trust that any inattentions that may at times arise, will be soon entirely eradicated, as every day's experience will teach you, that having been fortunate in your outset, it will behove you to be careful to gain justly the Character, which your first appearances have inclin'd many to hope may in time be realized.
