June 15: 1819.

My Dear Lord, Yours of 7th instant from Berlin has this morning reached me and the Dutch post office informed the letters of Lady Day and Mrs. Thindly: she desires me to say she need have written to those ladies but is busy as usual preparing to day to Leipsic etc: I shall take care to have apartments for your party from the Countess Widinstadt. The Dutchess is improving gradually and favorably in her health and Mr. Miday is so perfectly satisfied with her that he assures me she will be a stronger and healthier woman than ever: Lady met me at present in the subject of your health as unsatisfactory as ever: but I must repeat again home is the place for your Lordship and not travelling: simple quietness in time

For Consideration on the King's birthday: I wish the Duke
of Cumberland's letter: I thought the Duke would
receive it and I am glad he thinks not at present of returning
to England: the weather has been of surprising heat to a
degree: I have had a headache but very slight latterly which
was not for wanting going to bed and I have not taken any
medicine: it is very off & on and the change of air
will done good: my son is here all the Month of August
in July with Dr. Smith to Bognor: the Duke of Cambridge
his brother & heir has wished to the ladies: addressed them
and does believe me,
