Mr. General Taylor, having, in dutiful

 to him by Mrs R. G., begs most humbly to state, for Her
 Majesty's Information, the Result of his Conversation
 with them.

They observed that they had frequently
 observed to the Queen the Symptoms of Her Disorder,
 its Progress and the beneficial Effects of the Remedies

 Majesty's Relief from Suffering. - That they cannot
 however distrust themselves of the Belief that so strong
 an Expression of the Queen's feelings, and of Her Desire to learn
 their Sentiments, must be intended to draw from them an
 Opinion as to the possibility or probability of the Recovery.
 That they therefore feel called upon to say that, although
 They have found great Resources in the Queen's
 Constitution, and in the Powers of Her Digestive Organs,
 They could not venture, in any case, to declare that
 these Resources are sufficient, to relieve Her altogether
 from Apprehension. - That the Issue is in the hands
 of Providence; - They cannot control its Decrees
