I have the Honour to inclose for Your Majesty's Royal signature the Messages to the two Houses of Parliament. Your Majesty will observe that in the message to the House of Lords, mention is made of Your Majesty's intentions relative to Your Brothers, and as I told Your Majesty yesterday that Lord Marchmont and the Chancellor were of opinion that it was improper, it becomes necessary for me now to inform Your Majesty that upon talking with many Lords who understand order, it is thought advisable for

intention of the message. Lord Marchmont has altered
his opinion upon it & the Chancellor says that if it
can give the least degree of satisfaction to the Duke of
