N. B. On Monday 20th was with
the King at Richmond pursuant to
this appointment & staid with him
till half an hour after eleven.

Went afterwards to London. —
and down to S. House of Lords. — Debates on S. Riot of Weavers. —
of Mr. Lord Halifax in S. House of Lords would at Richmond & Duke of Bedford was upon S. Point of being turned out —
Who could dare to advise in so dangerous a State of Confusion to Admire S. King to turn out to prevent
deterring a man, & make him a victim to S. Rage of a popular Vice — Lord Sandwich & other Secretary
affected to intimate that three Rebs were a Plot (of Lord Bute,) to get S. Duke destroyed — or to colour his
being displaced — A factious Committee of S. Lords appointed on Pretence to discover S. Authors of the
Riot, but in reality to find matter to support their insinuations — to keep S. faction of S. Ministry loose —
thereby to create a Pretext for not adjourning S. Parliament — Mention of a motion
intended to address S. King to come from Richmond to reside in London — as a Reflection on his Retire-
ment and to alarm S. People as if the City of London & King Person were in danger — The House
of Lords this day attended by few except those of S. Ministry's faction.
