May 1765 — The Duke of Cumberland having been with him on Tuesday Night & till one o'clock on this Wednesday after having spent the greater part of Tuesday after we left the King's Closet in sounding The Duke of Newcastle Friends in a second time — & very Lord Temple.

I went to Buckingham House according to this appointment — Had with the King alone 2 Hours — He reported to me at that t. Duke had reported to him t. Night before

— The Duke of Cumberland had told t. King that he d. make no impression upon any one man of t. Duke of Newcastle, and confirmed t. Honor of Lord Temple & Greenville: — and still seemed to think t. King could not prevail to make a charge under all these difficulties.

The King in great distress after this paid me for my Advice & opinion whether any thing could
be done — (the Duke of C — I could do but very little more than those Repulses than to protest tht if
t. future he w'd. ever be the King (was only) I then told him if he commanded my advice I
K. (under all these circumstances, &c. Great disorder in t. City w. t. whole Army was still
employed to keep from breaking out in all Parts of t. City & Suburbs) think too hazardous for him
to rise up t. charges, unless he could by some means or other Oppose Party to Party, not by
