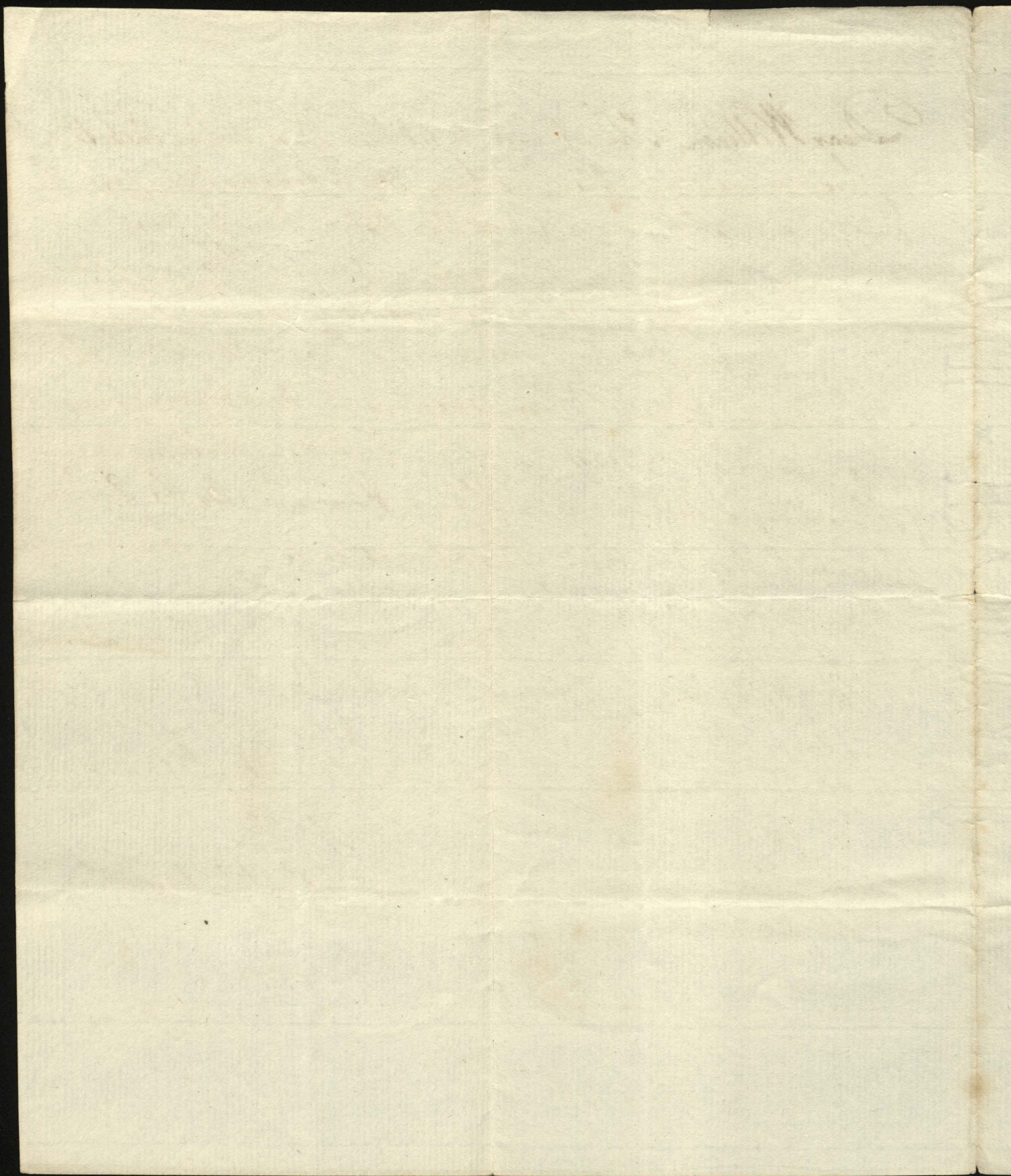
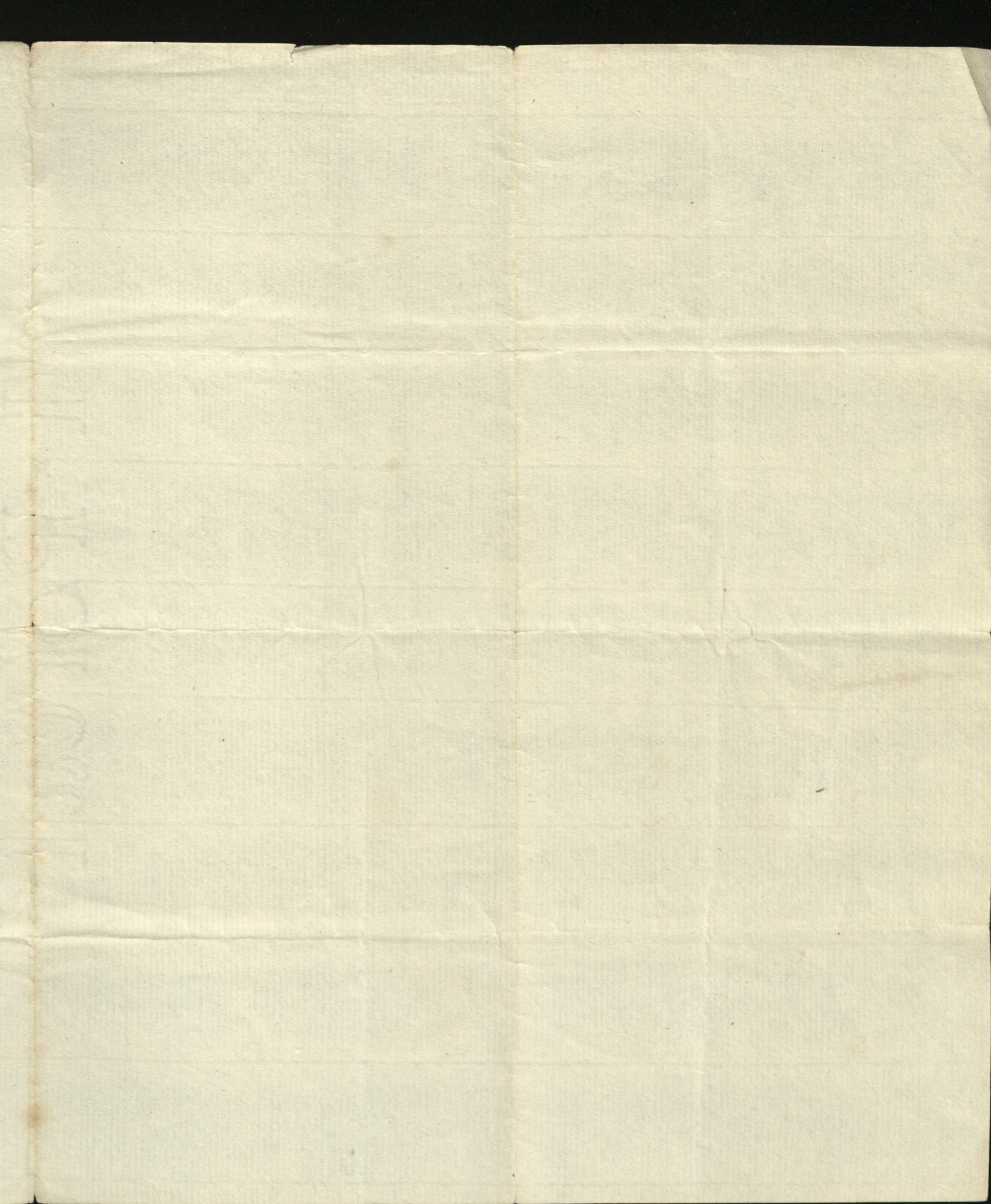


Dear William, I do not chuse to let the West India Packet sail
