My Dear William, had Lord Belp declined making a
Master or Commander of the Frattemans who had attended You in
the Barfleur it might have reasonably hurt You; but Mr. Mackenzie
was entirely unknown to You till You were on Board of the
Yacht it certainly never used to be the custom to have Midshipmen
on board of them made Lieutenants till the Queen came
from Stade, undoubtedly that was an occasion which
naturally called for any indulgence to the Service; but
great inconvenience would arise if every time any of my
sons go to the Continent a young person unknown to
the Admiralty should by the command of Yacht be
taken on board to get a promotion; You know me too well
to think I am from partiality to the present board
holding this language, but I must be just and have
the Service not partial instances as guides for my
conduct. Capt. Morris has acted very properly in
preventing Your having any claim to a promise of
future favours held out to you young man, that he ought
