Dear Brother,

My last from Jamaica was very short  
owing to that business, which I gave a very full account of to the King.  
I am now to inform you of another subject equally important to myself, but in which no other person is concerned: - Regarding health:  
my letter from the windward islands in May mentioned that I was  
just recovered from a rheumatic fever and from a general complaint,  
which showed itself in a bubble, and at that time was swelling  
over after the operation. I was a week going down to Jamaica during  
which time my strength returned every day; so that when I  
arrived at Port Royal, I may safely say I was perfectly recovered.  
I remained a fortnight at Jamaica, during which time the spirit of the  
trouble was somewhat present to my sleeping: this complaint is peculiar  
to the West Indies owing its vicinity to the sea and is always most

Some wholesome fum so long as it remains on the skin is kept off by  
vers: it appears upon the skin as a very small eruption, indeed the  
smallest I have seen when I was at Jamaica last year. This has been  
in the windward islands it does sometimes to be perceived upon my  
skin: but during this time I remained at Port Royal, bereaved  
every day and particularly in the head so that I had long continual  
most as big as a hill instead of being scarce perceptible at first  
with such violent heat and stinging as to prevent me from affording my  
sleeping: upon my going to sea I was not so bad the violence of  
the complaint was stopped. Went to the Northward, instead of  
which the precisely heat went off, and a great number of inflamed  
and large sores came upon my head and neck attended with inward  
fever and rheumatic pains and a fullness of the head and suffocation  
now only gave me for three days antiseptical medicines, but to  
no purpose: the symptoms increased except the fever, which gave  
way. These sores broke open whence came away a great discharge strong

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purgation did a great deal of good and I am now quite recovered in my  
sense for being a committee appointed to convey you to London. I have suffered  
what you hints I have had at any idle report; it is not very far. I have not  
present, but for myself in this same way when in the autumn I re-  
turned to Jamaica: the agitations there had never so violent that  
had this complaint attacked me at Port Royal, I daresay it will be  
like thy nose I have sprained fatal with the contumacy you  
may easily conceive. I do not look forward with any pleasure to my  
return to the West Indies. I never therefore many things to be  
considered: suppose I was to write to go some time next year  
strong objections I have the inclination I think it is the duty of  
every officer to remain abroad so long as his ship is kept over  
foreign station: the other from the uncertainty of the situation  
I am now in, nothing to depend on but what my father chooses to do.  
I enclose my last pay which is a hundred a year: no how to go  
to for Town. I will present him with the Y.C. when I receive letters.
