Sir,

I have the honor to acquaint

Your Majesty of my safe arrival in this port with the
 Valiant. I will not detain Your Majesty by giving an
 account of the fleet as my Lord Home will of course state
 the particulars in a more circumstantial manner than
 I could from my private situation in the squadron. I
 however add that on board my own ship no accident
 has happened and that I have every reason to be perfectly
 satisfied with the officers and men.

officer before I had the honour of being under his command,

that had the flats of this country, and specimens, I should
have conducted the Vulture into action with the greatest

confidence, more particularly when led and commanded
by so experienced an officer as the Earl Howe.
