of my power as I shall not be released this fortnight and by that

Saturday I had a letter from Berlin in which Frederick says something
of the King's not giving his immediate leave to marry, but from
Pankener who passed thro' Berlin in his way home I understand
that the marriage positively takes place Thursday evening.

How comes this sudden resolution?

I do not know what you did with Deloyville: he is returned
ten years younger and ten thousand times madder: he speaks in
raptures of you and everything at Brighton: the land he says
are very good: you cannot expect any news from me: There
only to observe the accounts from Weymouth are so highly re-
-doubled and absurd that I am ashamed the attendants do
not stop the papers:
