Dear Dr,

I have been two days and shall be  
away with Mr. Remond some time at least  
till we have made the attack on a fort which  
I trust will be successful in the next few days  
without losing the men. But I shall see  
what may be best to do: of course mentally  
I shall and must mind the affair; yesterday I went  
to Williamsburg and saw the place and fortifica-  
tions. It is at present very quiet except for a few  
of their admiralities whom I met at the fort.
